## GROOMING TIPS

Many of you still need to pay attention to your horse's elbows, belly and legs. This is the time of year that we start to see skin irritations due to poor grooming. After hosing your horse, curry and brush the sweat off your horse's body, paying special attention to those areas. Follow grooming with Healthy Hair Care.

Use caution and care when removing your horse's braids. We've noticed many horse's manes and forelocks are 'butchered'.

Please see Marcia or Kris if you are interested in a grooming clinic. Learning how to trim and proper mane care will save you \$\$\$ when preparing for a show.

## SAFETY REMINDERS

We all get comfortable and lazy and forget basic safety precautions.

- Please always have a lead on your horse when out of the stall.
- When turning your horse out, please make sure you turn it's head toward your body before you release the lead. This will prevent you from being kicked.
- When tying your horse (I.e., at a wash rack), use a safety knot. If you don't know what a safety knot is, ASK.
